Cathedral Conversations: Fr. Mike

I am both delighted and challenged to be among you as your transitional minister: an assignment that continues to amaze me because of its fascinating complexity. The challenge is first-of-all, to gather as many people as possible: extending invitations to both the people of God, as well as all those who may be searching for a deeper "faith." Then secondly, bring everyone together into a meaningful relationship with Jesus, the one we call the Christ. We celebrate that unique kind of religious gathering here at the Cathedral-of-the-Woods in a variety of ways – through worship, prayer, education, fellowship, administration, retreat, reflection, and yes, on occasion – party, party, party! Indeed, there's room for plenty of joy in the midst of our spiritual sincerity.

I have inquired at different times, in admittedly unconventional ways (usually at Coffee Hour) – what makes PCC tick? How do we explain and appreciate our unique heritage (which is unlike any other 'community' church in America). Perhaps even more importantly, how do we honor our sincere attempts at loving-our-neighbor, doing-unto-others, feeding-the-hungry (Casseroles Ministry), and welcoming-the-stranger? How in effect do we connect with unknown individuals, for example, people we have never met, who nevertheless follow our live-streaming broadcasts regularly? How do we put it all together?

Several long-time PCC members have proposed that we develop a redefinition of church-community. Our focus would highlight our inter-denominational approach and emphasize our ability to adapt to evolving networks and

Regular Sunday school ended June 8th and Summer Sunday School began June 15th.
